QUILTING: A MINISTRY OF LOVE AND COMFORT

One Sunday morning about ten years ago, I walked into the Sanctuary at First Lutheran and saw quilts draped over every pew, filling the space with color and warmth. It felt magical, and I thought, "I could do this."

Having sewn my whole life, I was immediately drawn to this ministry. A few weeks later, I noticed a basket in the church with quilt kits to take home. I picked one up, gave it a try and was hooked. Soon after, I started attending the monthly quilting meetings and I haven't looked back since.

For me, quilting has been a meaningful way to use my talents in service to the church. Each quilt starts as fabric and thread but becomes so much more - a symbol of hope, comfort and care for someone in need. Whether it's a family recovering from disaster, a community affected by war or someone in poverty, these quilts offer more than warmth; they show that someone cares.

Phyllis Frickel was a true inspiration to our group. Her dedication to this ministry and her role as a mentor left a lasting impact, reminding us how one person's faith and service can touch so many lives.

Participating in the quilting ministry helps me live

out my Christian values of love and service. While sewing, we often think about the person who will receive the quilt. Who are they? What challenges are they facing? We like to imagine the quilt bringing them comfort and strength during a tough time. This ministry has deepened my faith and reminds me to care for others, as Christ teaches us.

Hearing stories about how the quilts are used always reminds us why we do what we do. I recently spoke with a pastor who shared her experience visiting Africa. She described seeing quilts used to wrap newborn babies, cover patients in hospitals or even serve as room dividers in homes. Sometimes, these quilts become the only truly "nice" thing a person possesses in a third-world country. Knowing that something as simple as a quilt can bring such comfort fills us with gratitude and renews our commitment to this ministry.

If you're looking to get involved at First Lutheran, try the quilting ministry! You don't need quilting experience to join. You can help by tying quilts, cutting fabric or sewing pieces together. It's also about connecting with a wonderful group of women who share a purpose - to serve others. We laugh, share stories, and sometimes tear up, knowing these quilts make a difference.

Join us and spend a Thursday morning with some of the most inspiring women I've ever met. Together, we can share warmth, hope and love with people in need around the world. Who knows? You might just get hooked - like I did.

THREADS OF HOPE: FIRST LUTHERAN QUILTERS BRING COMFORT TO THOSE IN NEED

On October 20, we blessed 120 beautifully handcrafted quilts made by the dedicated quilting group at First Lutheran. Each month, these volunteers gather to create quilts for Lutheran World Relief (LWR), which partners with agencies worldwide to distribute them to people displaced by disasters, political unrest and war - those in urgent need of shelter and warmth.

Over the years, First Lutheran quilters have made and shipped over a thousand quilts to communities worldwide and in the U.S. Recently, we received a message from LWR about quilts that reached homeless veterans in Asheville, North Carolina, after Hurricane Helene. LWR shared, "Yesterday, we spent the day at a local hotel housing 168 homeless veterans. Before the hurricane, these men were living in transitional housing and rebuilding their lives. The hurricane devastated Asheville, leaving them without possessions or stability. A local hotel was secured to serve as their home for the next six months. Thanks to the generosity of Lutherans, each man received an LWR Quilt and Personal Care Kit. To say they were grateful is an understatement. One man, after placing the quilt on his bed, said, 'Ma'am, I put that new quilt on my bed, and the room just shone with those beautiful colors. Thank you for all the love in that quilt."

During worship, the quilts cushioned the backs of attendees as they prayed over them and blessed them, preparing them to bring comfort and show God's love to those facing homelessness, disaster or conflict.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

Even if you can't join the quilters on the fourth Thursday of every month at 9:00 AM, there are plenty of ways to support this ministry:

- Take a kit home to sew. Each kit has everything you need to create a quilt top and your work helps provide more finished quilts each year.
- Donate fabric. Each quilt needs 8 yards of 100% cotton fabric, either whole yards or pieces at least 11" square. If someone you know is clearing out fabric or hosting an estate sale, think of our quilters!
- Donate used sheets. Full, queen or king-size sheets (flat or fitted) make great quilt backs.
- Contribute financially. Donations help buy fabric and ship quilts to Lutheran World Relief. You can give directly to this ministry.
- Come to the Intergenerational Quilting Day Celebration on March 16 at 9:30 AM. Help tie quilts with the quilters!



KICKS FOR KIDS – THANK YOU FIRST LUTHERAN!

Every leap on the playground, every step into class and every big smile on a child's face - these moments are brighter because of you. Thanks to your generosity, Kicks for Kids continues its mission to provide new athletic shoes and socks to children in need and this year has been extraordinary.

With your donations of shoes, socks and monetary gifts, we've helped 265 students this year! These children, from 10 elementary schools, Las Abejitas Childcare Center and two middle schools, are walking taller because of your support. Requests are still coming in, but the impact you've made is already huge.

In the past nine years, we've provided 2,286 pairs of shoes and 6,858 pairs of socks to children in need. For many families, shoes are an unaffordable luxury - not something easily "passed down" like coats or shirts. Athletic shoes, in particular, wear out quickly from active little feet. That's where Kicks for Kids comes in - and it's all possible because of you.

We couldn't do this without our wonderful and compassionate congregation. Time and again, you step up with heart and purpose. Thank you for embodying the spirit of giving so beautifully through Kicks for Kids.

CHANGING LIVES ONE PAIR AT A TIME

There's something magical about a new pair of shoes. Trish Flury sums it up: "New athletic shoes mean pride, acceptance and inclusion." One little boy told his teacher he had never had new shoes before. Imagine how it feels to have something brand new, just for you, when it's been a lifelong dream.

Julie Reineke highlights this mission, saying, "It's thanks to the hearts of First Lutheran, their generosity and support for Kicks for Kids that we can continue this ministry." Your support isn't just about shoes - it's about the confidence and joy you bring to these children's lives.

The stories don't stop there. After delivering shoes to Las Abejitas, a little girl proudly showed off her "new shoes from her daddy." Donice Kaspar recognized the bright Kicks for Kids shoes and told her they were perfect and that she bet she could run faster than anyone. Her smile said it all - a true winwin moment for everyone.

Pastor Justin Eller, a former pastor of First, often talked about accompaniment - walking alongside those in need in our community. He would say, "These are OUR children! This is our chance to help other families with their basic needs."

The shoes and socks you donate to Kicks for Kids aren't just practical - they're transformational. They help kids run faster, jump higher, and, most importantly, feel seen and valued. For these children, it's about more than footwear - it's about belonging, confidence and dignity.

RECORD-BREAKING TOTAL FROM GIFTS OF HOPE MARKET

Through the energy and compassion of the congregation, an incredible \$24,539.50 was raised at the 2024 Gifts of Hope Market to support 11 life-changing organizations! This is the largest amount ever raised in the history of Gifts of Hope!

Held on December 7 and 8, the proceeds, along with strengthened connections and opportunities, are helping turn the congregation's Welcome Statement into meaningful action.

Here are some highlights from the weekend:

- \$5,000 raised online in just 38 hours as members engaged with video clips and photos in the online catalog.
- \$19,539+ raised in 4 hours during the inperson Sunday event, which was filled with buzz and excitement.

The in-person event showcased education and connection. Shoppers explored interactive displays and met representatives from local nonprofits like ECHO Collective, OutNebraska, Matt Talbot Kitchen and Outreach and I've Got a Name. Volunteers worked tirelessly as cashiers, educators and advocates, sharing programs like Food Backpacks, Quilting for Lutheran World Relief and ELCA World Hunger.

THE QUIET IMPACT OF EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS

Every Sunday, the congregation at First Lutheran Church gathers for worship, sharing in fellowship and receiving the Eucharist as a community. But what about those who can no longer join us in person due to illness, age or other life circumstances? For them, the extension of our church community - the Eucharistic Ministers - becomes a lifeaffirming source of comfort, faith and connection.

Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs) quietly serve behind the scenes, carrying the consecrated bread and wine from Sunday worship to our homebound members who cannot attend church. But it's not just about delivering the sacrament. These visits serve as a lifeline, reminding recipients that they are seen, valued and deeply cared for by their church family.

With just under two hours a month, the Eucharistic Ministry provides a meaningful, life-affirming connection for all involved. It serves as a vital bridge, ensuring our homebound members remain connected to the heart and life of the congregation.

To our current LEMs, thank you for your quiet, faithful service - it truly makes a difference. Your ministry is a beautiful example of how we extend our worshiping and fellowship community beyond the walls of the church. It's about more than just the sacrament - it's a tangible expression of our love and faith in action.

THE RIPPLE EFFECT DIFFERENCE

Terry Kruse, one of our dedicated LEMs, describes the Eucharistic ministry as deeply personal and faith-affirming. "I consider this ministry something that helps me to live out my faith in Jesus by serving other people," Terry shared. "I love my visits with Margaret, and she has told me, 'Thanks for everything you do for me. I can't tell you how much I enjoy your visits.""

It's more than a ritual; it's a relationship. Terry emphasizes the importance of listening and connecting. She spends about an hour with Margaret, sharing stories, relating to her past as a nurse, and ensuring she feels valued and connected to her church. Margaret has even mentioned how much she cherished previous Ministers, describing them as kind and fun.

For Tim Maack, a decade-long Eucharistic Minister, the experience is equally humbling and inspiring. "I am both honored and humbled every time I meet with those who receive the body and blood of Christ," he explained. Tim currently visits three individuals at Savanna Pines, one of whom is not even a member of our congregation. Yet, through the simple act of sharing bread and wine, he has formed meaningful connections.

"Every time I meet with others for this administration of communion, it reinforces my belief in God and in Jesus Christ," Tim shared. For him, this ministry is not a one-way street it's a mutual exchange of faith, love, and gratitude. It offers an important reminder of the power of service in strengthening both the giver's and the receiver's relationship with Christ.

LAS ABEJITAS & FIRST: CELEBRATING OUR PARTNERSHIP

At Las Abejitas Bilingual Education Center, we're excited to share updates with our valued partner, First Lutheran Church.

Liz Garcia, our former Lead Toddler Teacher, has been promoted to Assistant Director. Originally from California, Liz moved to Nebraska 10 years ago and brings six years of experience in early childhood education. She recently earned her Child Development Associate (CDA) credential and is thriving in her new leadership role. Her dedication continues to drive our mission forward.

We've also submitted our rating with Nebraska's Step Up to Quality (SUTQ) program, having surpassed quality benchmarks. While awaiting classroom observations, our SUTQ coach is working closely with us to maintain excellence. Our administrative staff has completed training to provide teachers with constructive feedback and impactful action plans.

Thanks to community support, enrollment at Las Abejitas is rebounding after many families transitioned to our central location at First Plymouth for shorter commutes. We currently have openings for children 12 months and older and maintain an infant waitlist. Of the 57 children in our care, 72% are from minority backgrounds, and 31% receive child care subsidies. Unfortunately, many families just miss subsidy qualifications and still face financial challenges. 

PRACTICING EMPATHY AND LIFE SKILLS ON SUNDAY MORNINGS

One recent Sunday during our Middle/High School Learning time, we explored a lesson called "Practicing Empathy." It's a skill we often talk about, but it's not always easy to define or apply. We started by breaking it down, defining empathy as understanding and sharing someone else's feelings.

Next, I gave the youth real-life examples like losing a pet, moving to a new school or failing a test. I asked them to come up with two responses for each: one empathetic and one not. They quickly identified phrases and reactions that made someone feel understood versus those that could feel dismissive. It was inspiring to see them recognize the nuances - it's not easy to step into someone else's shoes, but they were clearly giving it serious thought.

We then took the lesson further by heading to the Lego room. I asked each youth to build something that represented their "ick" - a challenge or frustration they've faced. Sharing these personal moments required vulnerability, but they stepped up.

One youth built her classroom and shared about helping a friend who found out during class that her grandmother had passed away. She explained how she helped her friend leave the room, find adult support and stayed by her side to comfort her. Listening to her story brought us all into that moment and I couldn't help but admire her act of empathy.



Another youth built a scene representing the pressure of getting good grades to earn a summer vacation. The group immediately rallied around him, offering advice, encouragement and the idea of finding a tutor if needed.

One youth made a project symbolizing the struggle to stay focused during lessons or homework. Before I could say anything, another youth jumped in, saying, "I totally get it— I've had the same problem!" He then began offering tips to help.

What moved me most was watching our youth let down their walls, share their challenges and offer empathy to one another. Being vulnerable takes courage and their kindness and support were remarkable.

I believe these moments of practicing empathy on Sunday mornings extend far beyond our time together. They're learning kindness, compassion and how to listen and carrying those lessons into their daily lives. Whether comforting a struggling classmate or understanding someone else's perspective, they're reflecting the love of Jesus in their interactions.

I'm so thankful for these Sunday mornings and the young people who are willing to learn and grow together.

PARENTS AND YOUTH EXPLORING FAITH TOGETHER AT DISCIPLESHIP UNIVERSITY

Discipleship University (aka Confirmation) is becoming more than a series of lessons - it's a space where youth and parents engage in meaningful faith conversations together. Sharon Hardel, Youth & Family Ministry Director, shared that the ministry offers a unique opportunity for families to explore faith together. "At first, conversations are slow to start, but over time, we're seeing youth and parents open up and share more with each other," Sharon said.

Pastor Andrew highlighted a recent breakthrough during a session on the Psalms. In small groups, the youth grew more comfortable sharing their thoughts, even with parents present. "It's been amazing to watch them come out of their shells and connect through these discussions," Pastor Andrew said.

Discipleship University also includes hands-on learning. In a recent session, youth and adults built Lego representations of stories from Joshua, Judges and Ruth. For some, these stories were entirely new. "Several hadn't heard these faith stories before," Sharon explained. "We read and built together, learning about the strength and courage of key figures in the Bible."

What made the activity memorable was the creativity. Parents and youth not only built scenes but also shared them with the group. "I think they'll remember these stories because they created them piece by piece," Sharon said. "It's a powerful way to connect with the narratives and reflect on the trust and courage these figures had



in God - something they can draw on in their own challenges."

Through thoughtful conversations and creative activities, Discipleship University is building deeper connections among families and a stronger understanding of faith. Sharon and Pastor Andrew hope Discipleship University leaves a lasting impression, helping youth and parents grow spiritually together.

WRAPPED IN LOVE: MINI VBS

Over three days (Dec 29-31), the Wrapped in Love Mini VBS brought members of all ages together to serve and give back in meaningful ways. Highlights included decorating quilt squares for a quilt the First Lutheran Quilters will assemble

After the service there were photos and congratulations. Lam and Nyakoat hosted a gathering in their home. The words, rituals and habits of this baptismal day were familiar, like those at other baptismal services I've witnessed over the years. But, it was opening that large white envelope and reading the words on the beautiful certificate that Pastor Andrew prepared for each baptismal sponsor that keep me thinking. "Barbara Johnson Frank has taken on the joys and duties of baptismal sponsorship for Sunday Duer, has witnessed this sacrament and will gladly help in guiding this new child of God toward a full life in the body of Christ."

I promised that I would rejoice in the opportunity to guide this precious child toward a life lived in the midst of a community of faith. What would that look like, I immediately wondered? How, along with her family, could I care for and nurture her? What does it mean for her to live fully at First Lutheran Church and among all of God's people?

HANDMADE BAPTISMAL REMEMBRANCES

Prayers take many forms within our church community. Some are voiced aloud during worship or at gatherings, while others are quietly offered in individual homes. At times, these prayers become tangible expressions of care - Afghans lovingly crafted for high school graduates, quilts sent across the world to bring comfort to others or baptism garments and napkins symbolizing a sacred moment.

Baptism garments and napkins are made by First Lutheran members. Phyllis Frickel, who entered eternal life last year, served as a faithful servant for Altar Guild, the Quilters group, Adult Choir, WELCA and other ministry groups. She made baptism napkins for several decades. Although she retired from making baptism napkins about four years ago, we had her napkins until this summer. FINDING JOY AND PURPOSE IN WORSHIP

First Lutheran Church is truly blessed with an incredible abundance of talented musicians, spanning generations. From 3-year-olds to members as old as 96, the contributions of these musicians make our worship services vibrant and heartfelt. The participation of FaithTrek, along with middle and high school youth, has brought a renewed sense of joy and energy to our services. Witnessing young people sing with their whole hearts is a source of happiness for everyone present.

The Orff Ensemble has created a space where even those who may feel shy can participate comfortably. Beyond the notes and melodies, every musician brings a unique story to their service. One musician shared a moving testimony:

"When I sing during worship, I experience healing. After a difficult week, my troubled heart is restored. Singing reminds me that I'm good at something, even when I've felt worthless all week. God fills me with such a sense of fulfillment that I can truly say, 'Thank you, God."

This powerful reflection highlights how music in worship can be transformative, providing comfort and purpose. Each musician serves for different reasons - some out of pure joy, others as an act of gratitude to God, while some simply want to do their part. For others, it's about stepping out of their comfort zone because they've been taught the importance of giving. Whatever their motivation, their contributions become blessings for both those who perform and those who listen.



And it's not just musicians who find meaning in their service. Volunteers in many other roles also experience profound connections through their contributions. One Altar Guild member shared: "Filling the wine cups for communion takes time, but it became a special moment for me. It's a time to slow down and talk to God. When I realized this, I started enjoying the process of setting up communion."

Our worship services thrive on the dedication of many hands. The word "liturgy" comes from the Greek word "leitourgia," meaning "work for the people" or "work of the people." Worship is a shared ministry, requiring the support of ushers, crucifers, communion assistants, Eucharistic assistants, Altar Guild members, Bible bearers, readers, greeters, choir members, musicians, teachers and even those who clean the pews and building. Each of these roles plays a vital part in creating a meaningful worship experience.

Have you ever wondered what it's like to serve as a worship assistant at First Lutheran Church? For many, it's more than giving back - it's a chance to grow, connect and deepen their worship experience.

Jenna Troutman, a member of First Lutheran Church, shares how serving has shaped her spiritual life and strengthened her faith. Her story is an invitation for others to step into this meaningful role.

For Jenna, serving as a worship assistant is about supporting worship and learning along the way. "I volunteer because I enjoy helping with worship," Jenna shares. "I want to be a pastor, so this helps me understand the flow of a service while learning and observing what happens."

Worship assistants take on key roles like leading prayers, reading, and assisting with communion. Jenna finds joy in these responsibilities. "I grow each time I serve," she says. "I've also loved working with Kayla seeing her confidence grow has been a highlight. We make a great team."

FACING CHALLENGES

Public speaking can be intimidating and Jenna admits it's not always been her strongest skill. "The first few times I served, I was really nervous," she admits. "It's gotten easier with practice, but I still feel a little nervous sometimes."

Her experience reminds us that even seasoned assistants face challenges, but confidence comes with time and practice.

GROWING THROUGH SERVICE

For Jenna and others, serving as a worship assistant is a meaningful way to connect with the church community while growing personally and spiritually. It's more than lending a hand - it's becoming a deeper part of the worship experience.

Serving as a worship assistant brings Jenna a sense of purpose. "It's not a dramatic change in my faith but more of a confirmation that I'm where I need to be," she says.

Serving has also made her more intentional during worship. "I listen closely to the readings, sermon and prayers. With each service, I learn something new," she shares.

ADVICE FOR NEW VOLUNTEERS

Feeling unsure about volunteering? Jenna recommends starting small.

"Roles like Bible Bearer or Crucifer are simple and don't require speaking," she advises. (continued on page 18)

The sign-up process is quick and straightforward. Follow these steps to get started using your desktop (the steps are similar on the Realm app):

- Log in to your Realm account (<u>https://onrealm.org</u>)
- Click Serving on the left-hand menu.
- At the top, select Opportunities.
- Click Browse by Role to view all available worship assistant roles. Select the roles you're interested in and submit each for approval. (Approval is a one-time process handled by Mandy West as a Realm safety precaution.)
- Once approved, you will receive confirmation. Return to Serving in Realm.
- You' will now be part of the Worship Assistants team. Click Worship Assistants and select Schedules to access the January– March Worship Assistant sign-up.
- The 8:15 AM and 10:45 AM service schedules will appear. Choose your preferred date and time and add yourself to the roles you would like to fill.

Steps 1-5 are a one-time setup. After approval, just follow Step 6 to sign up for future opportunities.

A GIFT OF FAITH AND BEAUTY: PASTOR MARY JENSEN'S ICON LEGACY AT FIRST LUTHERAN

The story begins in Jerusalem in 1986. Pastor Mary Jensen, then completing her seminary work at Wartburg Seminary, was on an internship in the city. One day, as Mary walked to a Lutheran church, something unexpected happened - a moment that would profoundly shape her spiritual life.


She passed a small shop and noticed art in the window that stirred something within her. Curious, she stepped inside and spoke with the shop owners, discovering the store focused on icons - sacred religious pieces with deep spiritual meaning. That chance encounter sparked Mary's lifelong passion for icons, a moment her brother, John Halvorson, fondly remembers. "It was a random stumble," he said, "but it became a major part of her faith for the rest of her life."

Mary's passion for icons went beyond admiration. They became central to her spiritual and ministerial work, culminating in a 200-page doctoral dissertation. She shared her love and knowledge of icons through classes at First Lutheran and other ELCA churches.

ICONS AS "WINDOWS TO HEAVEN"

To truly understand the depth of Pastor Mary's passion, it's essential to grasp what icons mean in the context of faith. Henri Nouwen once wrote, "Icons are created for the sole purpose of offering access, through the gate of the visible, to the mystery of the invisible." The Eastern Orthodox Church sees icons not merely as art but as "windows to heaven" - portals that connect the often broken realities of this world to the grace and beauty of the next.

(continued from page 22) Icons invite reflection, prayer and contemplation. They transcend form, offering a quiet place where the sacred can meet the seeker. The original creator of many cherished icons was Andrei Rublev, a Russian iconographer whose life spanned from 1365 to 1430. Rublev's work defied the rigidity of Byzantine Christian art, bringing forth a softer, introspective and celestial beauty. His icons radiated calm and compassion painted during a time of societal unrest but rooted in a profound faith in God's peace.

THE VIRGIN OF VLADIMIR – PASTOR MARY'S GIFT TO FIRST LUTHERAN

Before her passing on August 14, 2024, Pastor Mary carefully chose a parting gift for First Lutheran, a gift that reflects her faith and the depth of her connection to the church. The icon, a reproduction of Rublev's The Virgin of Vladimir - also known as Theotokos of Tenderness - was presented to First Lutheran during a Saturday night worship service in December by Mary's brother, John Halvorson, and her son, Dan.

The Virgin of Vladimir is one of Rublev's cherished works, created around 1400. Its composition reveals a tender interaction between Mary and the Christ Child. The Virgin's head tilts gently, her gaze extending out and away over the child's head, evoking an emotional depth that reshaped iconography through its connection between parent and child. Unlike traditional Byzantine icons, Rublev's approach captured moments of deep, divine tenderness - a trait later adopted by the Moscow School of Iconography.

HOW THE ICON FOUND ITS WAY TO FIRST LUTHERAN

Mary's gift was crafted with care and devotion specifically for First Lutheran by the iconographers at Saint Paul the Apostle Orthodox Monastery in rural southwestern Wisconsin. Iconographers see their work as prayer in action, spending weeks in reflection while creating their pieces. It took around four weeks to complete this reproduction, ensuring that every brushstroke held the spiritual weight the piece deserved.

Once the icon was finished, John and his daughter, Mary's niece, drove to the monastery from Illinois to receive it, before delivering it to First Lutheran. The icon will now be hung in the Chapel, the very space where Pastor Mary worshipped many Saturday evenings. It will serve as a lasting reminder of her faith, her love for her congregation and her desire to share her passion for icons as a vehicle for spiritual contemplation. Spend a moment in stillness in the Chapel and reflect before the icon she carefully chose for us. May her memory live on through this window to heaven.



CULTIVATING LOVE TOGETHER: CELEBRATING THE SUCCESS OF THE 2025 STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN


